

Don't Be Afraid To Lead

- President: Take charge of meeting
 - Start on time
 - Keep things moving
 - Use Roberts' Rules to maintain order
- Use a simple agenda ALWAYS!
 - Important things don't get "forgotten"
 - Trivial matters don't waste time
 - Refer little things to Committee & move on





- Secretary
 - COMPLETE & ACCURATE minutes
 - Constitution & By-Laws at meetings
 - Record and report on all mail & email
 - Submit minutes in time for newsletter
 - Keep Sick List & Get-Well cards
 - Keep applications for new members





- Treasurer
 - Always maintain books in readiness
 - Maintain current membership list
 - Pay all bills by due date (or discount date if applicable)
 - Custodian of Tax ID and documents
 - Pay taxes on time
 - Prepare/publish budget and status





Officer Obligations (3)

- Executive Committee
 - Meet monthly to handle routine business and minor items that would unnecessarily bog down meetings
 - Issue a full report to the members at each meeting to maintain transparency
 - Avoid "secret" meetings to the extent possible

- Start meetings on time
- Utilize agenda and Roberts' Rules
- President: Maintain order!
- President: Limit debate
- Officers: Do your Duty!



"Y" The Boring ARC

- Meetings bring up the exact same old "dead horses" every month
- Officers for life are re-elected yearly
- No activities (eating/drinking only)
- No guests/programs at meetings
- Visitors go unrecognized/neglected
- Shrinking numbers at meetings

- Finish business at each meeting
- Two words: Term Limits
- Interesting program or activity at every meeting
- Welcome and get to know visitors
- Remind members about every meeting & help them get there

- Never-ending bickering over trivia
- Attendees harshly criticize and publicly humiliate one another


